

Primary PE and School Sport Premium

The Government along with the Department for Health introduced the Sport Premium Grant Funding in 2013. This is allocated directly to primary school head teachers so that they can decide how best to use the funding to provide PE and sporting activities for pupils. The latest allocation of funds is the second of 3 annual payments worth a total of over £450 million which the current government is committed to giving to schools.

The vision of the Primary PE and School Sport Premium are as follows:

Vision:

A measurable and sustained improvement in school PE and sport, underpinned by high-quality teaching that increases participation levels in physical activity, and leads to healthier pupils who are more engaged across the whole curriculum.

Objectives:

- To improve the quality of existing PE teaching through continuing professional development in PE for generalists, so that all primary pupils improve their health, skills and physical literacy, and have broader exposure to a range of sports
- To increase participation levels in competitive sport and healthy activity of pupils, and maintain these into adolescence
- To increase the quality of initial teacher training in PE and sport, and to promote PE specialisation in primary level workforce
- Schools understand and value the benefits of high quality PE and sport, including its use as a tool for whole school development

Schools receive PE and sport premium funding based on the number of pupils in Year 1 to 6. Schools with 17 or more pupils receive £8000 plus an additional payment of £5 per pupil. This Education Funding Agency (EFA) sends academies the funding in two separate payments during November 2016 and May 2017.

St Joseph's Catholic Primary School will use this funding during the year 2016-2017 to:

- Employ Sport Educators (RB Gym and Sport) and PE specialists from Hagley Catholic High School to work alongside teachers to improve the quality and delivery of PE and school sport
- Provide continuous professional development for staff to develop their practice in the delivery of PE and school sport through Youth Sport Trust (YST) courses and access to professional advice from the Association for Physical Education (AfPE)

- Provide staff with access to professional advice regarding Health and Safety requirements, as well as the latest good practice and pedagogy in the delivery of effective PE and school sport (AfPE and YST membership)
- Enable pupils to become more physically active within PE lessons, and during break and lunchtimes (Cybercoach and extra-curricular programme)
- Provide greater opportunities for pupils to participate in competitive sport through the Sainsbury's School Games, Stourbridge Learning Partnership and the St Nicholas Owen Catholic Multi Academy Company Sports Partnership (SNOMAC) programmes
- Provide additional opportunities for pupils to participate in extra-curricular activities before, during and after the school day.
