Afterwards, talk to your grown up about it.




Story Time Activity 1 : Listen to the story

Learn Screen Author's Purpose


Authors write for 3 reasons:

To **Persuade** To **Inform** To **Entertain**

All you need to remember is **PIE**

All about PIE

To **Persuade** means the author is trying to make you do something or think in a certain way.


To **Inform** means the author is telling you some facts.

To Entertain means the author wants to tell you a story that you will enjoy.



Do you think there can be more than one purpose in any text?








Find Out Activity 2: What does Lindsay say?



Now listen to Lindsay Mattick talking about why she wrote 'Finding Winnie'





Writing Friendly Letters

It's fun to write a **friendly letter**, and even more fun to receive one. Letters keep you in touch with faraway friends and relatives. And they can feel more personal and special than an email.

Parts of a Friendly Letter

Friendly letters have five parts: the *heading*, the *salutation*, the *body*, the *closing*, and the *signature*.



The heading includes your address and the date.

- The **salutation**, or greeting, usually begins with the word "Dear" and is followed by the name of the person you are writing to. Place a comma after the name.
- 3 The **body** of the letter contains your thoughts and ideas.
- 4 The **closing** can be anything from "Love" to "See you soon." Follow the closing with a comma.

Put your signature below your closing.

You are going to use your questions in your letter. However, we can't just write a list of questions. We need to add some more information. We need to explain why we have been reading the story and what we thought of it.

That would never happen today! Did you ever meet Christopher Robin? If you did, what did you say to him?
