Words that Rhyme

Activity 3: Rhyming nouns

Now I want you to think of pairs of nouns that rhyme.

For example:

frog/ dog/ log/ mug/ rug

Be careful not to include names – you are going to use your ideas to create some more lines for the poem and names don't work!

Activity 2: Listen to a poem

Your Task

Now we are going to use some of your powerful verbs and rhyming nouns to create some new lines for the poem "Don't". Think carefully about matching your nouns and verbs correctly.

For example:

'Don't sit a mug on a rug' **does not** work but 'Don't drop a mug on a rug' **does**. Why? Talk to your grown up.

Try to write at least 6 pairs – you can write more!

I've put a couple of examples on the next page.



Example

Don't drop a mug on a rug Don't leave a skink in the sink!

Can you see how the nouns rhyme?

Can you see how the verb works with the meaning of the sentence. We often leave things in a sink or drop things on a mat. If we tried to say Don't make a sink with a skink, it wouldn't work!

> Just in case you were wondering, a skink is a type of lizard.
