Ceremony – a formal or public occasion celebrating an event.

Collectively – as a group or as a whole.

Inauguration – the formal admission of a new leader to their new position.

Inspire – fill someone with the urge or ability to feel or do something.

Oath – a formal promise, especially a promise to be loyal to a person or country.

Predecessor – a person who had the job before the current holder.

Prime Minister

The head of the government, who is in charge of leading the country. Our Prime Minister is Boris Johnson.

Supermarket manager

Part of their role involves giving other staff tasks, organising training and checking everyone is doing what they should be.

Headteacher

The person in charge of a school. Who is your headteacher?

Chief constable

The person who has overall responsibility for leading their area's police force.

Football manager

The person in charge of selecting players, planning their formation and strategy and motivating them to win matches! Frank Lampard is the manager of Chelsea Football Club.

If you have never been a leader, would you like to be? Why?


As a leader, you are in charge of other people. Do you think this would be a hard or easy job?

KS1 Follow up activities

Make a list of some of your leaders e.g. your sports coach, your teacher, your parents.

Choose one of your leaders to create an interview to find out more about them.

You could include:

- What do you lead?
- Do you enjoy being a leader?
- Do you think you are a good leader?
- What do you find hard about being a leader?



If possible, ask your questions and listen to the answers carefully.

You can draw a picture and write some sentences about your leader.

KS1 Follow-up activities

Lead a fitness session either for your family at home or in school.



Here are some things to think about:

- Plan your session
- Make sure you model what you want people to do
- Give clear instructions Give praise and encouragement
- Be supportive and positive
- Be confident



Once you have led your session, think about if you enjoyed being a leader.

Perhaps you could even ask the people you were leading if they enjoyed your session and if they thought you were a good leader!

KS2 Follow-up activities

The leader of the UK is called the Prime Minister.

- Do you know who our Prime Minister is at the moment?
- Can you name any other Prime Ministers from the past?

Imagine you are going to be the Prime Minister for the day! Create a timetable with all the things you plan to do.

Think about:

- What time will you get up?
- Will you schedule in mealtimes and breaks?
- Will you plan to change any rules or laws?
- Will you use the Voyager aircraft?
- Do you plan to address the nation?



Don't forget to include times. You could decide whether to record these in 12 or 24-hour clock.

KS2 Follow-up activities

Look at the picture that represents leadership.

- What do you like/dislike about it?
- Do you think it is a good representation of being a leader?
 Why?



List some of the qualities that you think a good leader needs.

Use them to help you create your own sketch or piece of art to represent what leadership means to you.

Think about:

- Will you use symbols, words, drawings or a combination in your picture?
- What colours will you use?
- Will the tone be bright and deep or pale?
- Will you use pencils, crayons, pastels, paints or materials?

Reflection

A leader is someone who leads or commands a group, organisation or country. Some people want to be a leader, others do not. Being a leader is a responsibility but a good leader can really make a difference!

There are certain qualities, skills and attributes which will help in positions of leadership. If you want to be a good leader, you can develop these skills. It is important to remember not everyone may want to be a leader and not everyone will agree on what makes a good leader.

There are many qualities that make someone a good leader. True leaders aim to see the bigger picture. They support, inspire and care about others ensuring that collectively they are helping to improve things for all.
