Over the next few weeks, we will be exploring the work of artists who use very ordinary objects and materials to make exciting and imaginative pieces of artwork.

What did he create? Take a look....












Let's get making.....


You will need:



strong, black coffee, tea (cold) or watery paint



a pencil or black pen



white or cream paper or card (e.g. from the inside of a cereal box)


What to do:


- 1. Spill your cold tea, coffee or paint on the paper.
- 2. Let it dry.

This takes a while so you might need to make your spill in the morning and make your monster in the afternoon.

3. Turn your coffee spill into a monster!


Use your imagination....there is **no wrong way** of doing this. Have fun!





Now try this....

- 1. Give your monster a funny name.
- 2.Turn your monster into a puppet by cutting it out and sticking it to a spoon or lolly stick.
- 3. Make monsters in different colours using different coloured paint, blackcurrant cordial, food colouring or orange juice.
- 4. Using a straw, blow on your wet coffee to create spikes, arms, legs or antennae or your monster.
