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
Good morning, Year 3. Happy Friday!

When you are writing, inverted commas (speech marks) go before and after what is being said.

For example:

"Everyone in Year 3 is working so hard at the moment," stated Miss Robertson.



Other things to remember:

- Punctuation such as commas, question marks and full stops goes inside the inverted commas.
- ✓ When a new person is speaking, start a new line.
- ✓ Remember to say who is speaking (e.g. shouted Miss Robertson, bellowed Chris, cried Amelia)
- ✓ Try and think of interesting synonyms/ other words for said to make your writing interesting.

Your task:

- \checkmark Use the speech bubbles that you did yesterday
- ✓ Look at the information page (on the previous page) for the rules for using inverted commas
- ✓ Use my example and the word bank on the next few pages to help you.


There is also a writing frame to help you if you need it ③

"H-h-hello, where am I?" mumbled the boy as he looked nervously at his new surroundings.


"Welcome to the Stone Age, the best place ever," said Om, politely.
