What's going on this week?

Armies in the UK and all over the world have played a key part in supporting governments and helping in many ways throughout the pandemic and it's likely that their role will continue in 2021.

In early autumn, the military helped to organise mass testing in Liverpool. In December, 1,100 military personnel were sent to help thousands of lorry drivers spending Christmas Day stranded at Dover.

Most recently, the Army have been helping secondary schools and colleges in England to set up mass coronavirus testing for their pupils.

What is a soldier?

A soldier is a person who serves in the Army.

A soldier needs to train and keep themselves fit so they are ready to serve at all times.

KS1 Follow up activities

Have you ever seen soldiers in a parade? Often, they are in very smart lines and rows.

Can you use your **toys** to make neat lines of soldiers?

Challenge:

- 10 soldiers, marching in twos
- 14 soldiers marching in twos
- 20 soldiers marching in fives
- How many rows and columns are there?

Can you write a number sentence?



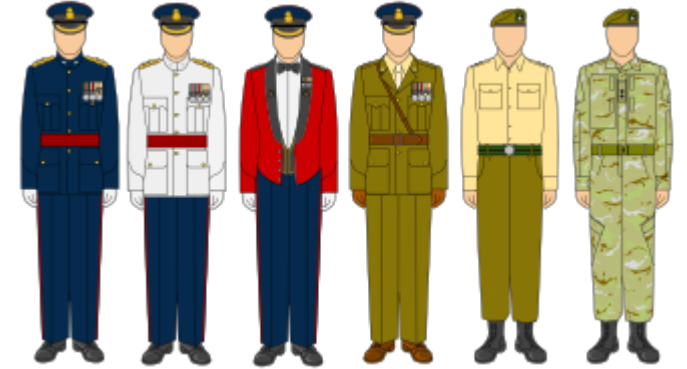
KS1 Follow-up activities

Look at what the soldiers in this week's poster are wearing.

It is a UNIFORM.

Can you think of any other people who wear uniforms?

Why do you think we wear uniforms?



Soldiers wear different uniforms depending which unit they are in or what job they are doing. Some of the uniforms they wear are designed to camouflage them.

- What does camouflage mean?
- Can you think of any animals that are camouflaged?

Design a uniform for a soldier to wear.



KS2 Follow-up activities

Create a **list of questions** you might ask a soldier to find out more about their role and their life.

You could plan and **write a letter** to a soldier. This could be someone you know or you could find the nearest base to send the letters. Think about:

- Why are you writing? To thank them for their work? To find out more about their role?
- Share some information you know about how soldiers have been helping recently.
- Ask any questions you have or share what you would like to know.
- Conclude by sharing your thoughts on their role.

You could always send off the letter. You may get a response!



KS2 Follow-up activities

Being a soldier requires a certain level of fitness. They have to pass a fitness test before they can join the Army.

Create your own fitness session.

Think about:

- What equipment will you need?
- How much space do you need and where will you carry out the session?
- Who will take part in the session?
- How long will it last?
- Can you make the activities harder or easier if needed?



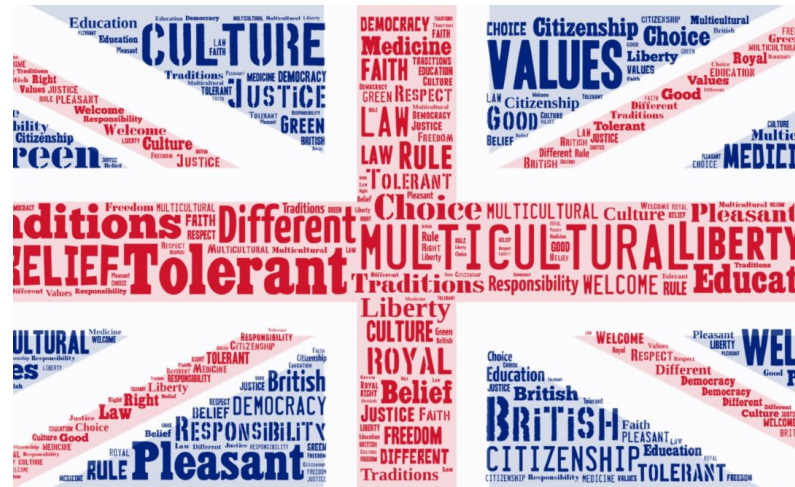
Reflection
