The Parable of the Pharisee and the Tax collector

(Luke 18:9-14)

In this parable, a **Pharisee** and a tax collector went to the temple to pray. The Pharisee prayed about how good he was, but the tax collector asked for God's mercy as he was a sinner. Jesus said that it was the tax collector who went home justified before God. He concluded, "Everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and he who humbles himself will be exalted."


The **pharisees** were a Jewish group

Tax Collectors were seen as sinners, they were Jewish but worked for the Romans (so many saw them as traitors). They did not get paid for their work so they would take extra money from people and keep it for themselves!

Think about...

Jesus wants to teach people the importance of praying with the right attitude. This parable is aimed at those who think they are very righteous and look down on others — like the Pharisee.

Jews had to pray three times a day and people would go to the temple for private prayer. The Pharisee stood up to pray, which was the usual practice. The Pharisee prayed about himself, informing God of the wrong things he had not done, "I am not like other men – robbers, evil-doers and adulterers". Then he spoke about all the things he did, fasting twice a week and praying daily. The Pharisee was really just praising himself.



Think about...

The tax collector, on the other hand, put his head down in shame to show how sorry he was. He knew he was a sinner and he knew he needed God to forgive him. Nobody can be proud of himself in front of God.

The men went home but only the tax collector had pleased God, as he had been humble and asked for forgiveness. A person's attitude is important to God.



Task 1: The Our Father

Our Father, Who art in heaven,
Hallowed be Thy Name.
