### Our School Early Help Offer

#### Early Help

We understand that from time-to-time family life can have its difficulties. At these times You may need some extra help and support. To help you and your family we have an Early Help Offer.

What is it? Early Help means providing support as soon as a problem appears, to stop it from getting worse. This could be at any point in a child's life, from birth to the teenage years. Anyone can provide early help – you don't need to be an expert professional. Early Help is not about passing the issue on to an expert, but thinking about the best support we can offer. What sort of Concerns might you share? These might be:

- Behaviour
- Attendance
- Financial worries and debt
- Domestic Abuse
- Housing
- Bereavement and loss
- Cyber Bullying
- Any concerns that you are worried about might be having a negative impact on your children

#### What might we offer in response to your concerns?

We will support you as a family in every way that we can. This might be through:

- Listening to your worries
- Key interventions such as nurture groups, time with a mentor, time with our mental health first aider or reasonable adjustments in school
- Targeted support
- Support and guidance to find the right outside agencies
- Completing an Early Help assessment with you
- Help and support with referrals to support services
- Support you with concerns regarding attendance

That is approximately 2 million children.</li> </ul>

<b>Fabricated and induced illness (FII)</b>	<p>Fabricated or induced illness (FII) is a rare form of child abuse. 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<b>Honour based violence (HBV)</b>	<p>Honour' based violence (HBV) occurs when perpetrators believe a relative or other individual has shamed or damaged a family's or community's 'honour' or reputation (known in some communities as izzat), and that the only way to redeem the damaged 'honour' is to punish and/or kill the individual. 'Honour' based violence is a term that is widely used to describe this sort of abuse however it is often referred to as so called 'honour' based violence because the concept of 'honour' is used by perpetrators to make excuses for their abuse. There is a very strong link between 'honour' based violence, forced marriage and domestic abuse. The term 'Honour Based Violence' is the internationally recognised term describing cultural justifications for violence and abuse. Honour Based Violence cuts across all cultures and communities: Turkish, Kurdish, Afghani, South Asian, African, Middle Eastern, South and Eastern European for example. This is not an exhaustive list. Where a culture is heavily male dominated, HBV may exist. The police have made it a high priority to help communities fight back to tackle both honour based violence and hate crime. The 'Honour Network Help line': 0800 5 999 247</p>
<b>Female genital mutilation (FGM)</b>	<p>Female Genital Mutilation (FGM) comprises all procedures involving partial or total removal or the external female genitalia. FGM is illegal in the UK and as of October 2015 mandatory reporting commenced. As with other forms of criminality or risk of harm, early intervention is always preferable.
